One of our Year 7's wrote this incredible 500 word story about dyslexia. We think it's important for everyone to read. The pupil has asked to remain anonymous.



Dyslexia is a funny thing, it all makes sense in my head and out of my mouth but on paper, well that's a different matter. How come everyone else seemed to find it all so easy. The words make complete sense to me.

Spelling tests are the worst thing ever, I learn the words in head over and over again, then I get to do a dreaded spelling test and it all goes to pot or should I say qot.

Life is definitely harder with Dyslexia but I don't think of it as a learning difficulty I now think it's a learning difference. My brain is just wired slightly differently to others, it makes how I see the world slightly different to a non-dyslexic. Round pegs and square holes is something that my mum says to me. I think without Dyslexics mankind would have died out by now. Only a Dyslexic would think of rubbing wood together to make fire and invent the wheel. You only have to look at all the famous people that have it to see, Albert Einstein - physicist, Steven Spielberg - Film Director, Richard Branson and many actors and actresses.



Someone famous once said about being Dyslexic "*Dyslexia is not a pigeonhole to say you can't do anything. It is an opportunity and possibility to learn differently. You have a magical brains, you just process it differently*" and that is something that I believe in.

I know that having Dyslexia will make things a little harder for me in the future. Sometimes when I'm at school and we are writing in lessons I feel as if I have a type of brake on and it permanently keeps me slowed down. Everything always takes a bit longer and a bit more effort.

Did you know NASA employs more Dyslexics than any other company in the world. They love people like me, we are the ones who can work out what seemly seems an impossible situation or problem, so there definitely is some perks to being a Dyslexic perhaps maybe one day I will work for them.

Castle Projects






















All 6 skiing instructors were good. The night time activities were really fun and a bit strange as they put courgette on a pizza! I would highly recommend this trip. Joshua



Science Week

All pupils were given the opportunity to come and experience the wonder inside the planetarium whether through lesson time or the extra sessions offered. Throughout Science Week the department did a range of activities. These included:

- Science club made crystal gardens.

Year 6 designed and made spaghetti antenna holding structures to be as tall and as stable as possible on sand.
Year 7 looked at DNA and inheritance linking it with careers in archaeology. They considered how scientists can use a mix of bones and DNA evidence to recreate faces from the past. Students made up a DNA profile code which was then interpreted and drawn by a partner.

Science Week

Y6 Science Visit to Johnson Matthey In Royston

A group of Y6 pupils were invited to take part in a Science Project - Challenging Children in Industry this term, led by Mrs Wallace.

The project was run by the Centre for Industry Education Collaboration (CIEC) based at the University of York, in partnership with industrial partners Johnson Matthey and Sartorius Stedim.

It provided a range of practical, stimulating science activities in School as well as being set in industrial contexts, which had been designed to enhance children's understanding of science and industry. The pupils learnt about the science of soap, filtration, viscosity of liquids linking the procedures to catalytic converters in cars.

The sessions were fun, very practical, giving pupils lots of opportunity to work in small groups developing skills on working scientifically.

The Practical lessons were led by Mrs Docking (from Johnson Matthey/Sartorius) and Mrs Wallace which linked to industrial storylines and this, together with the site visit to Johnson Matthey (a local industry) in Royston, encouraged children to understand the uses and implications of science in real life contexts.

The Staff at Johnson Matthey were so organised and enthusiastic as well as being fantastic with the pupils, giving a clear and detailed insight into the many careers offered by this industry.

The pupils thoroughly enjoyed the whole experience, especially the site visit which they found so exciting and invaluable – not to mention the 'Goody Bag' at the end of the visit. Myself, Mrs Panton and Mrs Saini who also accompanied the pupils on this visit were extremely impressed with the level of detail and preparation Johnson Matthey had put in to make a successful visit.

The pupils were a credit to the school and were very appreciative to Johnson Matthey for hosting the event.

Assessment Information

End of Year Testing and Assessment Calendar

Pupils are assessed continually throughout the year through a variety of methods. The timetable below is to let parents and carers know when key assessments are taking place in school.

In core subjects, end of year tests take place for all years (excluding Year 6 due to SATs) through a scheme published by GL Assessment. Pupils will be given a Standardised Age Score which is compared to a national average. The report to parents/carers offers a considerable amount of information regarding ways to help support your child in their learning as well as provide the school with valuable information regarding progress and attainment.

The school also conducts a series of tests to assess attainment progress across all subjects that pupils will be completing before the end of term.

Pupils will complete these tests with their usual teachers with the appropriate support in place.

They had probably been drinking in the local pub, The Five Bells, so when they knocked on the Vicarage door asking for the church key the Vicar sent them away because they were drunk. They were seen later trying to break the church door down, one using a crowbar. He was heard to say "Damn this door, I'll break it all to pieces". Another held a lighted candle to the door in an attempt to burn it down. They were arrested and taken to the local house of correction until they were acquitted of the charge of Riotous Assembly at the Easter Quarter Sessions, probably because the Vicar didn't want them to be transported!



2019 Service Pupil Premium

Extra Funding for State Schools, Free Schools and Academies attended by Service Children in England

Service parents with children in State maintained schools, Free schools and Academies in England are encouraged to ensure that the Head Teacher of their child(ren)'s school is made aware of their Service status ahead of the Spring school census deadline of 17 January 2019.

The Service Pupil Premium is provided by the Department for Education, to State maintained schools, Free schools and Academies in England who have children of Regular Armed Forces personnel among their pupil population to provide additional (mainly pastoral) support. Pupils with a parent on full commitment as part of the full-time Reserve Service (FC FTRS) are also classed as Service children.

Service Pupil Premium is currently £300.00 per Service pupil and is paid directly to schools.

Schools with Service children in Reception to Year 11 classes are eligible to receive the funding, but only if the child(ren)'s name appears on the school's roll as being a Service child.

The information recorded by schools regarding Service status is protected and data regarding individual children is not shared outside the school.






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General Reminders

Please ensure all money sent in to school is in a sealed envelope and has your child's name, class, what the money is for and the amount of money on the front.

FAQ

Q. My child has a tummy bug and isn't well enough for school. What do I need to do?

A. Call the school office on 01462 813733 before 9:00am to let us know. Children should not return to school after a sickness bug for 48 hours after their last episode of sickness/diarrhoea.

Q. I need to take my child to the dentist next week, do I need to let school know?

A. Yes please! Please inform the school office. Where solving please try to make appointments outside school hours/during school holidays. If that is not possible please make them for the start or end of the school day.

Q. I sometimes struggle to get all of my 3 children to school before the school gates close, being 5-10 minutes late doesn't really make that much difference does it?

A. It is important for all children to be in school on time as it can be upsetting for the child and disruptive for the rest of the class when children are late. Children who are late need to arrive via the school office and will get a late mark.

Did you know?

- 97% attendance means your child will have missed 6 days of school throughout the year.
- 90% attendance means that your child will have been absent for the equivalent of one half day every week.
- This also means that your child will have missed the equivalent of 4 whole weeks throughout the school year!
- If you take a two week holiday during term time your child's attendance will automatically be reduced to less than 95%.
- A two week holiday each year in school means a total of 14 weeks teaching time missed. This is the equivalent of a whole term and can have a real impact on your child's literacy and numeracy skills.
- If your child does not attend school regularly and you fail to work with the school and The Education Welfare Service you may be fined up to £2500 and in extreme cases sent to prison.

Things to remember:

- Keeping children away from school is a criminal offence.
- If you do not let us know why your child is not in school their absence will be marked as unauthorised.
- Looking after other children, going shopping, waiting in are not valid reasons to keep your child off school and will be marked as unauthorised absences.
- Some parents believe that their child is automatically entitles to up to 10 days out of school a year. **THIS IS NOT TRUE!** Parents can request to take children out of school during term time by writing to the Attendance Officer. However, holidays are only granted in exceptional circumstances. Holidays taken without permission will be recorded as unauthorised and the Education Welfare Officer informed.
