Democracy

The role of Democracy is embedded throughout the Academy. Students are given many opportunities to voice their own opinions and contribute to Academy life. Our students are taught to respect the rights of every individual through our PSHE lessons, and are encouraged to have their own opinions whilst respecting the views of others, allowing their thoughts to be heard. The School Action Group allows all students to meet, air and share their views and concerns to improve the student experience at Henlow.

The Rule of Law

The importance of law, whether they be those that govern the classroom, the school, or the country, is consistently reinforced. Students will be taught the value and reasons behind laws; that they govern and protect us, the responsibilities that this involves and the consequences when laws are broken. School assemblies and visits from authorities such as the Police help reinforce this message.

At Henlow we promote the importance of the rule of law through

- The Relationship and Behaviour Policy and Code of Conduct
- Liaison with outside agencies including Social Services and the Police when necessary
- Safeguarding policy
- A strong culture of self-accountability

Individual liberty

Within school, students are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing that they are in a safe and supportive environment. Students can access the use of students' support at any time and with the support of Pastoral support workers, the inclusion officer, school councillors and if necessary, outside agencies. Students feel that they are supported and listened to.
