Dear parents and carers

As we reach the close of this term and this extraordinary year, I again wish to thank you all for working alongside us. It has undoubtedly challenged all of us to adapt to new circumstances and I genuinely believe that Henlow Academy's ethos has given us the foundation upon which to build a new approach. Against a background of national concerns we have all faced our own worries and supporting young people through this has been of paramount importance. The community spirit witnessed in the many hangouts and assemblies has brought a different perspective - pets of all shapes and sizes, a sharing of technical skills and an openness about what we are all going through.

It bears repetition that the fund raising for Mrs Coster as she bravely faces the challenges ahead has been a supreme effort by members of our community. This newsletter includes a message she has dictated for us to share with you all.

Year 8

We have found a way to say goodbye to Year 8 - not the way we wanted to but one which has brought smiles to many faces. The exhibitions which record the four year journey were stunning and we didn't think this could be done! In fact videoing your own presentation or producing slides suited the approach many pupils wanted to take and we have learnt a great deal through this endeavour.

On Thursday we met pupils in small groups and most of the year group attended in order to receive hoodies, certificates and year books. The year book itself is a fabulous record of the 'term that never was' in addition to commemorating their previous years at Henlow. The pictures of the day reflect how unique it was. We followed this on Friday with a final assembly in which we reflected on the last four years with lots of laughter (I think) at the dancing/singing skills of the form tutors!





Reports

We felt it was important in these circumstances to find a mechanism to share key information on the work pupils have engaged in - hence the questionnaire home to yourselves. The government were explicit in their advice to schools regarding reports - there must be a written record sent home regarding the work produced during this partial school closure. Please be reassured that the interim report we sent home earlier in the year is also a key document recording pupils' progress this year. The end of year report will be part of a conversation in September at the planned consultations and is not regarded as a final document of the overall year. With regard to Year 8 pupils, both reports will be shared with upper schools alongside an explanation on our approach to writing these reports.

During the partial school closure we have been giving out a considerable number of awards - Head of Year, Deputy Head and Headteacher. These have been recorded but in some cases the report may have been published before updates were added. Records will be checked and updated.

Goodbye

We say goodbye to lan Lee and Sue Welsford who are retiring - in later pages we pay tribute to all that they have given to Henlow Middle and Academy. I am grateful to Mr Lee for his leadership of year groups and the design department. As a leader of trips he has consistently ensured that pupils have fun and are safe. This type of meticulous planning has been appreciated by staff, pupils and parents for many, many years. Mrs Welsford joined Henlow Middle as a temporary teacher and has stayed for nearly 20 years! She has taught a wide range of subjects and given our Science department in particular teaching and leadership skills that we are very grateful for. Both staff will, I'm sure, remain part of our school community.

Naomi Chalkley, one of my Deputy Heads will be taking adoption leave and will be returning part way through the next academic year. I am sure you will join me in wishing her well as she becomes a mum.

September 2020: Our return

As a senior team, we have made a draft plan based on the current guidance from the government, however this is very likely to change before the restart. We will send our final, detailed plans for the beginning of term in the week before the start back, however our current thinking is as follows:

When will my child start back at school?

Only Year 5 will return for the first 2 days of the new academic year, Monday 7th and Tuesday 8th September 2020. This will allow us to orient the new pupils and to familiarise them with the school and the routines that we will expect them to follow.

During this time we will be running a series of virtual reverse parents meetings for pupils in Years 6, 7 and 8. This is to allow the parents/carers and existing pupils to have a conversation with their tutors and to provide an update of where pupils are pastorally and academically and for us to signpost and plan support as we reintegrate into a different way of school life. Our recommendation in general is that form tutors are the first port of call when contacting the school as they know your child the best and so we feel it is important that you have the opportunity to talk to us about what your child might need. School will begin for all pupils on Wednesday 9th September 2020.





How will pupils be organised?

Pupils will be invited back in bubbles, pupils in Year 5 will remain in their form group bubbles and teaching staff will move between these rooms to teach them. In Year 6, pupils will largely remain in their form rooms and teachers will move to these rooms to teach them with the exception of maths which will be banded according to ability. Pupils in Years 7 and 8 will follow the same model as Year 6, meaning that we will be able to band for maths and modern foreign languages. Rooming has been mapped out so that year groups are grouped together and so that pupils do not mix with other bubbles as far as possible.

What will pupils need to bring with them?

It is very likely that we will ask for pupils to bring in their equipment on their first day of school and to leave it their form room at the end of each day.

Pupils will likely be asked to wear school uniform which should be regularly washed, ties tend not to be a part of uniform that is washed regularly and so they will not be required. Pupils may wear their summer polo shirts if they wish. A full uniform list is available by following this link. When pupils have PE, they will be asked to attend in PE kit. Cloakrooms will not be used in the same way as there will not be the same movement around school and as there will not be the same need to transport material to and from school. Realistically, pupils should be bringing themselves, their packed lunch if they have one and a water bottle to and from school on a daily basis. All other equipment should be brought to school at the beginning and then left site. on

How will pupil behaviour and social distancing be managed?

Parents/carers and pupils will be required to sign an adjusted Home: School agreement that reflects the guidance around health and safety with regards to Covid-19.



Government guidance is quite clear that our practice must adjust to incorporate appropriate implementation of social distancing and sanctions should it be persistently or maliciously breached. You can find a link to the Home: School agreement here, please take the time to read it with your child(ren) and, by completing it, sign to agree to it.

The school day will be structured so that there are staggered start times between 08:30 and 09.20. Start times will be staggered by surname to support families who have children in more than one year group, and by method of transport. This is because bus routes have time tables that are interlinked with routes to other schools.

Break and lunch times will be staggered. During lunch time, we aim to deliver hot and cold school lunch options to classrooms so that pupils can still access school meals without adding unnecessary risk by eating in the communal spaces. Pupils will be encouraged to bring in their own breaktime snack which should be healthy and wrapperless as there will be no break time snacks available from the canteen and we will want to maintain the cleanliness of the site. Outside areas will be allocated for social time to preserve the bubbles and when the weather prevents pupils from going outside, they will remain in their form rooms.

The end of the school day will also be staggered, between 15:30 and 15:45, following the same system as at the beginning of the day to allow family groups to leave at the same time and to cater for the bus routes. Parents/Carers and pupils are encouraged to make their way home immediately without congregating at the school gate.

What about attendance?

As you will know, attendance to school is expected for all pupils from September, we will work closely with the local authority to ensure consistent expectations across the county and support families where necessary. We are awaiting further guidance from CBC which is likely to be published over the next few weeks.





What about transport to and from school?

We are awaiting guidance from CBC regarding social distancing rules for CBC provided bus routes, we will publish advice for parents as soon as we have a clear picture. If driving your child to school, please continue to use the Millennium Fields, The Five Bells, The Cricket Pavillion or the Church layby. Please do not drop pupils into the school site as there will likely be more pupils taking different routes around the school site to avoid contact with different bubbles. We would encourage all parents/carers to adopt the social distancing requirements that are in force at the time. If pupils cycle or scoot to school, they should not be on their bike/scooter whilst on the school site, they should be pushed instead. Pupils should not be sharing bikes/scooters

How should I make contact with the school if I need to?

All parental contact with the school should be via phone or email. The main phone number for the office is 01462 813 733 and the general email address is info@henlowacademy.org.uk or you can email the member of staff directly at initialsurname@henlowacademy.org.uk. Where appropriate, a virtual meeting can be arranged. Please avoid coming into the school office unless absolutely urgent as it is very unlikely that we will be able to meet with you without a prior appointment.

What about wrap around care?

The vast majority of pupils will need to be dropped off and collected at their allocated start and end times to reduce the risk of mixing between bubbles.

There are not likely to be any extra curricular clubs running.

Breakfast Club will be open but must be booked in advance to allow planning to try to maintain the bubble system which will likely need to be sectioned into year group areas, where possible we will try to implement this at a form group level.



Homework Club and 16:45 Club will be running. To minimise contamination of bubbles we would please ask that pupils attend these clubs only if it absolutely necessary.

Do you have any advice about safeguarding during the summer break?

First and foremost, we recognize that whilst we have all undergone the lockdown period together, the journey has been very different for each of us. All of our circumstances have been different and our experiences will have been very different as well. Children will all be feeling some anxiety and may be struggling to come to terms with the return to school. We would encourage you to take time to talk to children about mental health, remind them that it is ok to talk and that their feelings are valid. Let them know that you are interested in what they are doing, model good habits and watch out for any changes in behaviour.

We would encourage you to monitor phone/online activity closely, there has been a national rise in the reports of online abuse either between groups of peers or by unknown adults. It has been brought to our attention that an application called Kik can be used to circumnavigate parental controls, so this is well worth watching for.



We have been incredibly sad that we haven't been able to give our Year 8's the traditional Henlow send off but we have done all we can to recreate as many of our traditions virtually.


Year 8 Exhibition


Year 8 Awards Evening








Year 8 Collection Event


Design a Badge Competition

Mrs Coster Update

Thank you all for all your kind words gifts and cards. They have been really helpful to me. I've been so touched by the love that you have shown me and this has helped me through some of the darker times of my recovery. Even though at times the situation I'm in is difficult, I am so grateful to be alive. I am due to have a video assessment to see where my rehabilitation can take place. It is likely to be in Roehampton, which has a unit specialising in rehabilitation of amputees and specifically of those with multiple applications. I understand that I will be spending most of each day in the gym. Those pupils I've taught may well be laughing now! However, to make you laugh even more, I'm actually really looking forward to that. I'm intending to learn to walk again and to get the funkiest legs I can possibly find, so prepare for shocks! I'm also hoping to get some prosthetic hands and to learn to use them properly. I'm not sure how long it will take me, but I understand that it can take around 3 months or more.

I fully intend to come back to school in September to see you all. I know Year 8's will have moved on, but I'm hoping that I can arrange to see those of you who want to see me. I also intend in the future to come to some school events, hopefully selling my denim creations so maybe I'll see you all there.

Again thank you so much to those of you who have sent cards, to those of you who prayed, to those who have left comments on my Facebook page, to those of you who have donated, to those of you who've held your own fundraising events (which have really touched me), and to those of you who've just held me in your thoughts. Love from Mrs Coster

"If you don't SHUT UP I will FEED you to my DOG!" I yelled from under the pillow.


